STEWARDSHIP OF GOD'S EARTH

I have been mindful of the amount of water I use when I make coffee ever since learning that one-third of the tap water used for drinking in North America is actually used to brew our daily cup of java. If each of us avoided wasting just one cupful of coffee a day, we would save enough water over the course of the year to provide two gallons to every one of the more than 1.1 billion people who don't have access to freshwater at all.

That is a stark statistic, when as many as 5 million people die unnecessarily each year because of the lack of water and water related illnesses. One-third of which are under the age of 5. So for me that excess cold coffee at the bottom of the pot became a bothersome reminder. But I never thought beyond that--about how much water it took to grow that coffee.

The water that it takes to grow or manufacture any product is called virtual water. For example it takes about 155 gallons of water to grow a pound of wheat; 5 to 10 times that amount for a pound of meat; an apple, 19 gallons; banana, 27; a slice of bread, 10; a sheet of paper, 3; a pair of leather shoes, 4,400. Everything has a virtual water count. Proper management and use of the world's virtual water already saves water. Places with less water gain access to foods with high water requirements by importing them from areas with high rainfall. This allows water-scarce regions to use their own water resources for other purpose. It is all about being smart with water. We can be smarter and we need to be.



September 9, 2014

Meeting called to order at 7 p.m.

Opening prayer led by Pastor Ken.

Tom Wagener discussed and showed a model of the new window panels that are made of a durable material from which highway signs are made. This material is different than what we talked about in our May meeting. The cost would be about \$375.00 per window totaling approximately \$12,000 for all 32 windows. A congregational meeting will be held September 28, 2014, immediately after worship to determine financing options.

Motion made by Michelle to approve the August council meeting minutes & Semiannual meeting minutes. Second by Dan. Motion carried.

Treasurer's report (see finances on page 3):

- Our general fund contributions for this month are \$270.98 more than last year.
- There are several options to reduce the cost of our offering envelopes. They can be purchased, preprinted, through another company for \$3.49/100, or purchased in bulk for \$21.34/1000 and printed in the church office. Dan will check with his employer to see if he can find a better solution.

Motion made by Dan to approve the Treasurer's report. Second by Camille. Motion carried.

Pastor's report:

- Confirmation
 - ♦ Eight-8th graders and eleven-7th graders in attendance.
 - ♦ The church purchased study bibles at a cost of \$320 for the kids to use during confirmation.
 - On September 17, the confirmation class will be going to Confirmation Kick-off in Taylor.
 - ♦ The confirmation class will be going to the Strum Nursing Home to visit with the residents one Wednesday each month.
- The second service will start September 21. There will be some changes from the 9 a.m. service. They will be having communion each week, using real bread, and Gabe Koxlien will be providing music each week. The service will start at 11:15 a.m.


